

## ARCS Pittsburgh: Board Brief

## **August 2016:**

With our awards to our partner universities this year, to date ARCS Pittsburgh has committed more than \$1.6 million to 113 outstanding Ph.D. scholars in our region.

## August 2016 Board Meeting: Setting goals for our new year.

Our new Finance Director, Linda Thier. continues the strong financial leadership of her recent predecessors, Angie Maher and Missy Unkovic, orienting all board members to our budget and financial projections for the year. Our scholar awards are made each January, so that our partner universities (Pitt and CMU this January) can attract the best-andthe-brightest Ph.D. students to their nationally ranked research programs for the following fall. The awards, \$15,000 over three years for each eligible scholar, are "in the bank" years prior to determining how many scholars we can fund. Thus, we never commit to more awards than we absolutely can fund. But without replenishing the fund, the number of scholars we can support diminishes. This year we have a goal of growing membership to 120 members, securing 6 new Named Award Member-Donors, and pursuing one new corporate Named Award. If we meet these goals, we will replenish our Scholar Fund and be able to continue to support about 30 scholars each year.

Thus, we encourage all of our members from last year and former members to renew membership before 12/31/16, engage with our scholars and other members, and enjoy the benefits of our programs.

By April 2016, our ARCS scholars reported that they were already demonstrating science achievements. Of our 31 scholars, several have already contributed to publications in respected science journals. They report this with enthusiasm, "I just got my first article published this year!"

Nearly all report receiving additional financial awards and prestigious recognition. Nearly one-third received a National Science Foundation Fellowship (NSF) or honorable mention. NSF Fellows receive a three-year annual stipend of \$34,000 along with NSF has a long history of funding outstanding tuition funds. scholars who have gone on to being our country's future science leaders. Other ARCS scholars from last year received similar fellowships, such as the National Defense and Science and Engineering Fellowship. We have a Presidential Fellowship student, two Steinbrenner Institute Fellows, one National Academy of Science Ambassador, a Microsoft Graduate Women's Scholar, an Asia Rice Foundation Scholar. One of our students reported already receiving a patent.

One scholar, who considered going pro in table tennis, continues to impress on a local team. Several are avid gardeners, beer brew-masters (giving workshops at their universities) or musicians (one is a free-lance French Horn player).

Our well-rounded scholars are rapidly becoming science-leaders. Use this year to get to know more about their areas of research as well as about them as people. **University Relations:** Karen Slevin, Chair, reported that this year we will begin looking into expanding the approved programs/departments in which new scholars may be considered. The process requires that a program/department be top ranked in the country in research, meet other qualifications, plus is approved by the science advisors of our national organization, ARCS National. **Programs:** Victoria Wellstead, a new member of ARCS, has jumped right into a leadership role by serving as our Program Chair. The events that she has scheduled or is working on are:

October 13, 2017: Villages of Shadyside Clubhouse, 6:00pm-8:00pm presentation by Dr. Rich McGough, Chief of musculoskeletal oncology at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center, on osseointegration (the functional connection between living bone and the surface of a load-bearing artificial implant). Dr. McGough's work on mind-controlled prosthetics is groundbreaking for those who lose limbs due to cancer. With his work, the robotic arm attaches to an implant inserted directly into the bone and nerve reassignment surgery then allows brain signals to direct motion. November 2016: Presentation by a Pitt Professor on a technology subject.

May 2017: Tour of the new Frick Environmental Center. The new center is opening in September to much anticipation. The building was engineered to meet the highest standards of sustainability (the Living Building Challenge and Platinum certification for the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design). Solar panels will power all electrical systems; it will use 40% less energy than other buildings of its size in this region; and it will filter and treat all wastewater onsite.
