Behind the Science Event

On June 12th, ARCS Pittsburgh and the Magee-Womens Research Institute and Foundation (MWRIF) co-hosted an event titled "Behind the Science: Transforming Women's Health through Pharmaceutical Innovation." Held at MWRI in Oakland, the gathering welcomed more than forty ARCS members and guests for an informative presentation from renowned leaders in women's health.

Dr. Lisa Rohan, professor in the Departments of Pharmaceutical Sciences and OB/GYNE/RS at the University of Pittsburgh, delivered the keynote address. Her pharmaceutics laboratory within MWRI focuses on developing innovative, safe, effective, and acceptable drug delivery systems that meet the evolving needs of women. Several active research initiatives reflect this mission.

Beth Wainwright, ARCS National President and a proud representative of ARCS Pittsburgh, shared updates on both local and national accomplishments and challenges. **Janice Devine**, MWRIF's vice president of development, provided an overview of the institute's work and highlighted the urgent issues facing science and women's health research today. Within this context especially, ARCS Pittsburgh was pleased to announce that the new Collins/Citrin-Cwenar-ARCS Pittsburgh Member Scholar Award Endowment at the University of Pittsburgh, which will support women's health research.

OMETIMES AN IDEA CROSSES YOUR MIND of something that might be fun, adventurous, productive, or otherwise an interesting thing to do. Most ideas stay there—in the recesses of your mind and are never acted upon—for good or bad. Every once in a while, however, the moment is right and the team is a good one and that idea becomes a reality.

This is what happened in May when more than seventy women, including thirteen ARCS Pittsburgh members, representing thirteen Pittsburgh women's

organizations met for lunch at the Pittsburgh Botanic Garden. The idea for this gathering to Celebrate Pittsburgh Women originated a year ago at a Pittsburgh Symphony Association luncheon. A team of several Pittsburgh women,

including ARCS Pittsburgh members Bev Elliott and myself as well as Susan Edwards and Nancy Zappala from the Pittsburgh Botanic Garden board, and Heather Chronis Danek, immediately embraced and acted upon the idea.

Organizations in attendance included the Alpha Alpha Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.; ARCS Foundation Pittsburgh; Child Health Association of Sewickley; Garden Club of Allegheny County; Girl Friends, Inc.; Junior League of Pittsburgh; The Links, Inc.; Ladies Hospital Aid Society; Northeasterners, Inc. Pittsburgh Chapter; Pittsburgh Botanic Garden; Pittsburgh Symphony Association; Women's Committee Carnegie Museum of Art; and Women United.

In addition to ARCS and our focus on scientific education and research, the assembled groups

included those working on health and human services, art and music, education, horticulture/garden design and conservation, civic service, women's leadership, volunteerism, as well as issues that particularly impact the African American and Jewish communities in Pittsburgh. We encourage you to check out these organizations online for a better understanding of the breadth of their individual and collective impact.

Networking across organizational lines was a top objective for the Celebrating Pittsburgh Women

> gathering and, judging from the noise level of the assembled group, it was eminently successful. A second objective was to introduce these

organizations and their members to the Pittsburgh Botanic Garden,

not only as an addition to one's personal "must visit" list but also as a possible venue for meetings and events. This goal also appears to have borne fruit as evidenced by several questions regarding the space available for such gatherings. Finally, we hoped that our speaker, **Doug Heuck**, publisher of the *Pittsburgh* Quarterly and CEO of a new regional initiative, "Pittsburgh Tomorrow," (https://pittsburghtomorrow.org) might provide some basis for further inquiry and conversation as to how the women's organizations of Pittsburgh might be involved in furthering this effort.

Our hope is that many additional "good ideas" might emerge as a result of this celebration of Pittsburgh's women—ideas that each individual organization might pursue but hopefully also ideas for collaboration, interaction, and partnership resulting in many more celebrations in the years to come.


grabbing that hand tight. Words cannot convey how much that has meant to me. Thank you.
